Our vision for a fully accessible New Brunswick continues with passion and determination.

I am proud to be the President of such a high performing organization. We continue to build our visibility as a highly accountable organization that goes above and beyond to help people with a mobility disability. Daily, our team helps to break down roadblocks in areas such as mental health, home support, housing, transportation, income supports and recreation.

The Board and employee teams worked together this year to develop our new five-year strategic plan for 2023-2028 where we will focus on the following strategic commitments:

- · Improve our organizational resilience.
- Increase knowledge and awareness of programs and services.
- Expand our fundraising base and secure sustainable funding.
- Be a leader in influencing public policy for people living with a mobility disability.

#### Devin's story NEWFOUND FREEDOM AND FUN

For Moncton youngster Devin Bent, a wheelchair ramp has opened up a whole new world of possibility.

It used to be that he was dependent on his mother, Shelley Totten, to get in and out of the house – a tedious and laborious routine up the five steps.

Too big now to lift, Shelley would instead help Devin lift each leg up a step at a time, and he would crawl across the threshold into the house.

They did that together for almost a year, in all sorts of weather.

Complicating matters was how exhausting and difficult it was for Shelley, with her bad knees and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease. That and her fiancé works six days a week and so has not often been available to help.

But now, thanks to the work and advocacy of Ability New Brunswick, the boy with cerebral palsy can wheel himself in and out of the house when he pleases.

"Since we have had the ramp and since Ability New Brunswick got involved it has been an amazing time for him," Shelley says. After hearing from Shelley, Ability New Brunswick first tried to secure financial support for the family to allow them to install a ramp. But the family income was just above the threshold for aid.

The family contemplated a private fundraiser to try to come up with the thousands of dollars they would need when Ability NB found someone in Bouctouche, N.B. who was selling a used ramp.

Erin LeBlanc, a transition planner with Ability New Brunswick, even went to see the ramp and shared the Totten's story with the man selling it. He was so moved, he donated the ramp.

Erin didn't stop there. She enlisted her father and husband, and all three of them joined the Totten's neighbours to install the ramp over two weekends earlier this year.

The newfound freedom has allowed him to meet other kids in the neighbourhood, and to get out for more activities with his family.

"We've been able to get out every day, out for hours on end, to get out to do some fun things. We've been able to get to a neighbour's pool and swim," Shelley says. "It's just been a life-changer."

In 2022 – 2023, We:




Provided services to **436 persons** with a mobility disability in NB.

Provided one-on-one planning support to 147 youth with a mobility disability throughout NB.




Received 42 new referrals.

#### PARA NEW BRUNSWICK SPORT AND RECREATION PROGRAM

In 2022 – 2023 Para NB – Sport & Recreation:

- Delivered the adapted sport and recreation Equipment Loan Service which has a total of 600 pieces of adapted equipment worth approximately \$856,000.
- Helped 5,869 persons with a disability get active.
- Helped 28,923 persons without a disability get active.
- Processed 1,500 loans requests from individuals, sports groups, schools and communities.

- Has 395 participants with a physical disability, 28 coaches, 6 officials, 227 volunteers, 98 physical education specialists, 63 occupational or physiotherapists registered with our research and interests database.
- Collaborated on 51 Para Sport and Recreation activities and events.
- Partnered with 26 sport and recreation organizations.
- Delivered 12 presentations/information booths.
- Conducted 18 accessibility reviews for recreation facilities.
- Highlight: 81 different schools accessed the Equipment Loan Service.

#### PEER MENTORSHIP PROGRAM



Developed role descriptions, agreements, application forms, screening tools, a handbook and training content.



Partnered with NBCC graphic design students to create recruitment flyers, facebook banner, and a stand-up banner.



Created a program brochure.




Recruited, and screened of 16 initial mentors.

#### **ACCESSIBLE NB**



Program development began in June 2022.

- A technical team was formed to provide expertise and advice by reviewing the existing accessibility review tool and updating it to current codes and standards.
- An online data management system was created. Pre and post accessibility review surveys for employers were developed to assess the review experience and impact.
- Branding materials such as a program pamphlet and social media banner were created.
- A promotion plan was developed to promote the program to employers.



- During this period, 17 reviews were conducted and 6 events or presentations were attended.
- Rick Hansen Foundation Accessibility Certification (RHFAC) training began for 16 staff and 2 board members.
- The Accessible NB manager joined the RHFAC Technical Subcommittee for the development of Rating Survey 4.0.



#### **INFORMATION SERVICES:**

Ability NB responded to 962 information and presentation requests from the general public through our information services (telephone, e-mail, social media) with a total of 1,803.25 hours.



#### THE VEHICLE RETROFIT PROGRAM:

In 2022-2023, the Vehicle Retrofit Program approved a total of 46 applicants (46 individuals, 0 organizations) and committed a total of \$189,415.55 in funding.



#### **VOLUNTEERS:**

Volunteers are the cornerstone of our efforts. In 2021 – 2022 volunteers contributed 195.25 hours in the following areas: Board of Directors, with the Para NB – Sport & Recreation program and in office support.



Hours of staff professional development were logged.

### INFLUENCING PUBLIC POLICY

### PUBLIC POLICY AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

In 2022 - 2023, Ability NB developed submissions and presentations, and actively participated in numerous meetings and engagement opportunities with policy makers to represent the voice of persons with a mobility disability. Highlights from our policy activities include:

- Participated in a Seniors & Healthy Aging engagement session with Social Development, to help inform the new aging plan for New Brunswick.
- Met with the NB Child & Youth and Seniors Advocate to discuss key trends facing youth and seniors, systems challenges and solutions.
- Met with the Minister of Social Development re: housing, seniors services and service delivery partnerships.
- Met with the Minister of Finance as part of pre-budget consultations with non-profit organizations.
- Met with the new Minister of Housing to discuss affordable, accessible housing.
- Met with Canada's First Chief Accessibility Officer.
- Executive Director was appointed to the NB Seniors' Advocate Long-term Care Review.
- Submitted a brief to NB Seniors' Advocate Long-term Care Review.
- Participated in the provincial Housing Summit hosted by NB Housing corporation.
- Submitted a brief to the NB Housing corporation for the new provincial housing plan.



In partnership with the New Brunswick Disability Executives' Network (NBDEN):

Submitted a letter to Social Development re: lack of wage top ups and incentives for private support workers.

Developed and submitted a letter to the Early Learning engagement with the Department of Education, and Early Childhood Development with recommendations for the early learning action plan.

Presented to the Select Committee on Accessibility re: An Accessible NB Act framework.

Attended the introduction of the legislation to amend the Employment Standards Act to eliminate situations in which people living with a disability receive less than minimum wage for doing work comparable to that completed by others. Ability NB was a key informant for this amendment.

Celebrated the introduction of a new act to replace the Infirm Persons Act. Ability NB was a key informant for this new act.

Completed a draft of the accessibility legislation and presented it to the Executive Council office.

Met with Canada's First Chief Accessibility Officer to discuss the Accessible Canada Act.
